2. Do One of the Following:

- A. Create a timeline for yourself or for a relative. Then write a short Biography based on that timeline.*
- B. Keep a journal for six weeks. You must write in it at least once a week.*
- 3. With your parent or guardians help, choose a relative or family acquaintance you can interview in person, by telephone or by email or letter. Record the information you collect so you do not forget it.*
- 4. C. Obtain at least one genealogical document that supports an event that is or can be recorded on your pedigree chart or family group record.*
- D. Tell how you found it and how you would evaluate the genealogical information you found for requirement 4. You do not need to bring the record with you a picture will be fine.*

6. Begin your family tree by listing yourself and include at least 2 additional generations. You may complete this requirement by using the chart provided in the Genealogy merit badge pamphlet or the genealogy software program of your choice.

7. Complete a family group record form, listing yourself and your brothers and sisters as the children. On another family record group form show one of your parents and his or her brothers and sisters as the children. This requirement may be completed using the chart provided or the genealogy software program of your choice.

ALL DAY COURSES:

Policies and Procedures:

Anyone participating in this event will be expected to follow Scouting America's National Guidelines as outlined in the Guide to Safe Scouting.

The Law is the Rule: Everyone is expected to abide by the Scout Law, Oath, Slogan, and the Venturing Code.

Buddy System: Everyone will use the Buddy System,

Alcoholic Beverages: This will not be tolerated and is against BSA policy. Possession or use will result in immediate dismissal from our event.

Smoking: An important way adult leaders can model healthy living is by following the policies on alcohol, tobacco, and drugs. Leaders should support the attitude that they, as well as youths, are better off without tobacco in any form and may not allow the use of tobacco products at any Scouting America activity involving youth participants. This includes the use of electronic cigarettes, personal vaporizers, or electronic nicotine delivery systems that simulate tobacco smoking. All Scouting functions, meetings, and activities should be conducted on a smoke-free basis, with smoking areas located away from all participants. As outlined in the Scouter Code of Conduct, Scouting activities are not a place to possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies: alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana. In addition, the Code of Conduct specifies that if you are taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing any functioning or judgment, you will not engage in activities that would put Scouts at risk, including driving or operating equipment.

Vehicles: Must be parked in designated parking areas.

Uniforms: Field uniform will be needed for all Flag ceremonies. If you do not have a field uniform, then an activity uniform is sufficient. Please be prepared for the weather. Some activities will be outside so dress accordingly.

Knives or Firearms: No firearms are permitted at this event. No fixed blade, sheath or survival knives are permitted. Folding or pocketknives are permitted by those Scouts that have earned their Whittling Chip or Totin' Chip.

Rocks and Sticks: Although tempting, rocks must not be thrown or kicked and sticks may not be swung. Injury/damage to property usually results from this action. Such actions will result in your being asked to leave the event immediately.

First Aid: The health officer will be on site during the activity. Medical Emergencies should be directed through them. Units are responsible for assuring/handling all medical forms (A and B). In case of emergency notify any of our staff, or our Admin area.

Cleanup: Please trash your trash! We are being granted permission to use this site as a favor we want to keep it looking lovely. Scouts should keep up with their backpacks and supplies.

Emergencies: In the case of a weather emergency, Scouts should seek protective shelter.

Refunds:

A refund will be made to an individual or group that cancels program attendance/registration, less a 15% administrative charge as long as a written request is made at least 30 days prior to a council or district program/activity.

No refunds will be given to an individual or group that cancels program attendance/registration within 30 days of a scheduled council or district program/activity.

Exceptions for medical situations or family emergencies can be made but must be submitted in writing within 7 days after the program/activity.

Fees are transferable to other scouts but not refundable. All requests for refunds must be submitted in writing with a copy of the receipt or canceled check.
