It guides program planning before the year begins, monitors activities for continuous improvement during the year, and recognizes performance at the end of the year. The district may qualify by meeting either determined or performance improvement standards.

1	The council will approve goals for the district, defining bronze, silver, and gold determined standards. The district may be evaluated based upon achieving an overall fundraising goal or achievement of the individual elements, as defined by the council. There is no improvement performance standard for this criterion, as it is being measured against goals.

Scoring the district's performance: To determine the district's performance level, the council will use the above information to measure the points earned for each of the 16 individual criteria and then add those individual point scores to determine a composite score. Bronze level requires earning 1,000 points, Silver level requires earning 1,350 points and Gold level requires earning 1,650 points (and achieving at least bronze in key items marked with a star *).
